## COMPETITION TIME! DESIGN YOU' AFEA FLAG



The Cultural element of the Northumberland School Games is very important as is developing crosscurricular links. Pupils participating in the 2014 Northumberland School Games will take part in a parade of athletes from Concordia to Sporting Club. Following the opening ceremony each day the 6 area teams, accompanied by their Team Mascot, will be led out by specially chosen flag bearers.

Pupils now have the chance to design the flag for their area team, which will then be professionally produced

on a large scale. The flag designs must include the area name (not the school name) and one or more of the School Games Values. Designs can either be hand drawn or computer designed and should be submitted on a piece of A4 paper along with a written explanation of what the design is and what it represents. Each school should select one winning entry and submit this to their School Games Organiser, before Friday 28th March.

Cross-Curricular links may be with art and design or within IT for producing the designs; links to history and the miners' parades and flags, as well as local history, landmarks, and notable figures who might feature on the flags. Similarities can be drawn with the Olympic & Paralympic Opening Ceremonies or the 2014 Commonwealth Games. This could be an ideal activity within tutor time, as an opportunity to explore the School Games Values and how they might be applied to whole school life.

#### 2014 SCHOOL GAMES KITEMARK Criteria Set

The 2013/14 Sainsbury's School Games Kitemark criteria is now available to download from www.yourschoolgames.com The kitemark rewards schools for their commitment to and the development of competition, school sport and physical education.

If you would like to find out how other schools achieved the kitemark and how they worked towards meeting the criteria, there are 12 case studies also on the School Games website.

The Sainsbury's School Games Kitemark is assessed against bronze, silver and gold criteria, and is an annual award which must be reapplied for every year. The application window will be open later on this academic year, schools will be notified of the exact date in January 2014.

Five schools from Tynedale competed in the County Indoor Rowing championships. Three rowers from Corbridge Middle, three from Haydon Bridge and fourteen from Queen Elizabeth will now represent Northumberland in the regional finals next year.

#### Project Ability

The number one aim of Project Ability is to have more young disabled pupils taking part in competitive sport. Project Ability is delivered as part of the School Games, and includes:

- bespoke training, developed by the Youth Sports Trust to provide local advice and guidance to School Games Organisers and schools through the Project Ability Lead
- the establishment and implementation of even more local competitive opportunities for young disabled people, this includes come and try festivals; and
- the development of school club activities.(especially Multi Sports Disability Clubs)

Schools can use the inclusive formats developed by the YST in their School Games intra and inter-school competition (Levels 1 and 2) Disability events are included within the Level 3 county event.

Schools whose pupils need more substantial or significant help can utilise the <u>TOP Sportsability</u> resource, available free from the Youth Sport Trust. Your SGO has received training and resources to support the programme.
