



Dear Parents/Carers,

Although not all pupils and staff were able to return after the half term break due to Covid isolation, the second half of the autumn term did start positively for the majority of the Eastlea 'team' and thank you for your support for our increased 'Covid secure' measures which we alerted you to on 1<sup>st</sup> November.

At a 'virtual' meeting for all Northumberland Head Teachers on Friday afternoon, schools were encouraged to continue to follow the county guidance at the moment in response to the increase in infection rates over recent weeks. The situation is reviewed fortnightly and as a result of these procedures and the increased number of secondary school children being vaccinated they do hope that measures MAY be able to ease before Christmas – but we will keep you informed every step of the way.

In the meantime, at Eastlea the children are doing a super job of maintaining their hand washing/sanitising routines, classrooms are well ventilated, indoor class mixing has been reduced and the amended lunchtime routines are running smoothly. THANK YOU!

### School Admissions for Reception 2022 – a reminder

For parents of pupils due to start in Reception next September please remember that the admissions portal opened on 1<sup>st</sup> November and closes on 15<sup>th</sup> January. It is very important that you complete an application for a place as soon as possible. **Even if your child currently attends our Eastlea Nursery then you must make an admissions application for a place in Reception September 2022.** The information about this is all on the Northumberland County Council website (school admissions) and you will receive confirmation of places on 15<sup>th</sup> April 2022. ### Christmas events

You will see from the outline list of proposed events that we are again restricted in terms of what we can do as a whole school and for obvious reasons we are being advised to limit occasions when parents/carers/wider family members are invited onto the school site. This clearly has an impact on the Eastlea Christmas.

We will modify activities where we can so that the children still have the opportunity to enjoy the festive season in school, e.g. the virtual Christmas Fair, the class based parties, Christmas lunch at class based tables. We will NOT be able to perform our usual Christmas productions for everyone in the hall, but are working on recording productions for each key stage which will be shared with you as we did last year.

Remember, as we cannot have formal face to face parents' appointments in school in the usual format, **class teachers will be contacting you to outline how they will be updating you on how your child is settling in and the progress they are making.** This may be informally face to face, via phone or in writing.

## Online safety at home: Parents/Carers newsletter

**Thinkuknow** is the national online safety education programme from the National Crime Agency. Thinkuknow offers learning activities, advice and support for children and young people aged 4-18 and their families.

With some children still learning from home, they will be spending more time online doing their school work, playing games or watching videos. Technology is hugely valuable for education, as well as a way to keep in touch with friends and family. However it's important we all consider how we can support children's online safety. Here's some information about what your child may enjoy online and what you can do to help keep them safer:

### Sharing pictures

Using devices like phones and tablets to share pictures and videos can be a great way for children to have fun and stay in touch with friends and family.

It's really important your child knows what's ok to share online and what they should check with you first.

### Watching videos

Children love to watch videos and YouTube is always a firm favourite! But sometimes children can be exposed to videos that are not meant for them.

Remember, primary-age children should be supervised at all times when online.

## Steps you can take to help keep your child safer online

**Parental controls:** Parental controls have been designed to help you manage your child's online activities. There are various types, some of which are free but others which can be bought. However, nothing is totally fool proof so this shouldn't replace the support and guidance you give your child to help keep them safer. **Supervise their online activity:** Keep the devices your child uses in communal areas of the house such as the living room or kitchen, where an adult is able to supervise. Primary-age children should not access the internet in private spaces alone, such as in a bedroom or bathroom.

**Explore together and chat little and often:** Ask your child to show you their favourite apps, games and sites and encourage them to teach you how to use these. Ask them if anything ever worries them online. Make sure they know they won't be in trouble and can get help by talking to you or another adult they trust if anything happens online that makes them feel worried, sad or scared.
