Introduction

Welcome to Eastlea Primary School.

This prospectus provides information for parents/carers of children wishing to know about the opportunities available at our successful school.

We trust that you find the information clear and useful. We will be happy to provide, on request, any other information you may require.

2007 saw the transition from Eastlea First School to Eastlea Primary School. The school now caters for children between the ages of three to eleven. Children stay with us until they transfer to the Cramlington Learning Village in Year 7. Our Nursery class currently offers half day morning placements for children aged three to four with 39 places available. The vast majority of our Nursery pupils transfer to Reception at Eastlea.

In September 2009 Eastlea moved into a newly refurbished building. In this bigger, better appointed building we provide spacious, well equipped accommodation. We have eight classrooms each with a shared wet area and quiet area. In addition, we have a well stocked Library, Resource Room, an ICT Suite and a central hall, which is used for assemblies, PE and also serves as a dining hall.

In May 2012 Eastlea Primary was inspected by Ofsted and the improvements made since the last inspection in all aspects of the school were recognised. The school was judged to be **GOOD** in all areas and the capacity for further improvement was also deemed to be good – see page 5. For further details of our very positive pupil outcomes in terms of academic achievement see the links on our school website.

The school has a hard play area with play equipment, a garden area, a developing enclosed nature area, a grassed area and new outdoor equipment for Early Years as well as an outdoor classroom used by the whole school.

Cramlington Kids Club, based on our site in blue 'mobile' accommodation, provides child care for babies through to pre and after school care for older children.

OUR SCHOOL AIMS

We aim to have pupils who are happy, confident and interested in life and enthusiastic about the changes they encounter.

Throughout the ever changing climate within education, we aim to continue to support our children's learning.

Towards achieving these aims we endeavour to:-

- provide a secure, caring and welcoming environment for children, parents staff and visitors.
- plan a broad and balanced curriculum for our children, following the National Curriculum at a level appropriate to their age and ability.
- promote effective teaching and learning where children are encouraged to achieve their full potential.
- ensure that all children have the opportunity to achieve their full capability in the basic skills of Literacy and Numeracy.
- value children as individuals, developing self-esteem and their ability to take responsibility for themselves and their actions.
- encourage children to respect others and develop a caring attitude to their environment.
- recognise and value previous learning and to foster trusting relationships where school and parents work together in partnership.

OFSTED INSPECTION REPORT

Date of Inspection: 1st – 2nd May 2012

Key findings – a summary of the strengths of Eastlea

- Cramlington Eastlea is a good school. All aspects of the school are good, including the effectiveness of the Early Years Foundation Stage. Typical comments from parents and carers, such as, 'Best school ever', 'A friendly, caring school', and 'I cannot praise the school enough', sum up their positive views of the school.
- Pupils' achievement is good. From starting points that are generally below age-related expectations on entry to Nursery,

pupils make good progress and typically leave in Year 6 with attainment that is in line with national averages. This includes pupils who are disabled and those who have special educational needs.

- Teaching is good and some is outstanding. Teachers provide interesting learning experiences that enthuse pupils and allow them to practise their basic skills in literacy, numeracy and communication.
- Pupils have positive attitudes to their work and behave well. They say that they feel very safe in school and are active in promoting safety for others. They describe their school as 'friendly and kind' and say that bullying rarely occurs. Attendance is average but improving.
- Leadership and management are good and there is a very happy, purposeful climate for learning. Management of performance and leadership of teaching have been instrumental in the improved success of the school. Both the curriculum and the promotion of the pupils' spiritual, moral, social and cultural development are good.

Next steps – how the school can improve further towards outstanding

- Further improve achievement by:
 - Sharing more effectively the best practice in teaching
 - Always focusing clearly on pupils' learning when judging the quality of teaching
 - Persuading all parents and carers of the importance of regular attendance of their children
 - Deepening pupil's understanding of life experiences in the wider community that reflect the diversity of culture in Britain today

Pupils are confident to talk about their experiences of school and enjoyed sharing their views with the inspectors. They particularly appreciate the awards, not only for good work but also for good behaviour, and say that this encourages them to behave well and work hard.

The school engages with the parents and carers well. The questionnaires showed that they are positive about all aspects of the school, including the extent to which the school helps them to support their child's learning. Parents and carers, as well as pupils, told us of the positive impact of 'Golden Days' on behaviour.

Eastlea Primary – TOP of the Chronicle's 'Real Schools Guide 2016'

For the last two years the Evening Chronicle has produced a 'Real Schools Guide' where they rank local schools to give parents an idea of which schools will help their child prosper.

Their analysis includes factors such as pupil attainment, the quality of teaching, pupil progress, whether children are doing better than expected and their attendance. In both years Eastlea has been ranked in the top 5 schools.

The most recent ranking was published in the Chronicle in January 2016 and Eastlea were **TOP OF THE LEAGUE** in Northumberland. This is a huge achievement and one of which we are very proud.

Eastlea Primary – Local winner

In 2016 the school was also recognised as a local winner in the Pupil Premium awards. This award recognises the hard work that goes into providing quality education and outcomes for all of our pupils. It celebrates the fact that we have sustained a pattern of high levels of pupil achievement in our KS2 results over a number of years regardless of the background of pupils. We were the only school in Northumberland to be listed as a 2016 local winner and it is super to have the hard work of the whole Eastlea team recognised in such a high profile way.

Eastlea have achieved great success year on year since the School Games kitemarks started. We are the only local school to have retained the gold award for two consecutive years.



SCHOOL ORGANISATION and ADMISSION ARRANGEMENTS

Eastlea Primary School is a single form entry establishment. We have one class in each year group and our standard admission number is 30 in each class (except for Nursery which can cater for up to 39).

We have an 'open door' policy and encourage anyone thinking about enrolling their child at Eastlea to come and have a look around to see what we can offer. Simply ring the school office to make an appointment.

ADMISSIONS TO NURSERY

We have a 39 place Nursery. Children are admitted to the Nursery the term after their 3rd birthday. An introductory meeting/session is held before the end of the term before pupils start so that parents/carers and children can get a feel for what goes on.

A Nursery application form needs to be completed if you wish your child to be admitted. These can be downloaded from the school website, or picked up from the school office. Completed forms must be emailed or handed in to the school and are filed in the order we receive them depending on the start date requested.

STARTING RECEPTION CLASS

In line with Northumberland County Council's admissions policy, children are normally admitted to Reception in the September following their fourth birthday (i.e. rising five).

A meeting for parents/carers and their children is held every summer term for children who will be joining our Reception class in September.

Every parent/carer must express a preference school including those whose child attends our Nursery or who are resident within the designated catchment area for Eastlea.

This form is available online via the Northumberland County website and should be completed and returned at the appropriate time following county guidelines.

JOINING OTHER YEAR GROUPS

If families wish to enrol their children in any other year group at other times then an 'in term admission' form needs to be completed on the county website to request a place. This form is available online from Northumberland County Council and should be completed and returned to them so that places can be allocated.

SECONDARY SCHOOL TRANSFER

There is one secondary school in Cramlington (Cramlington Learning Village). We have strong partnership links with this school and the vast majority of our pupils transfer there when they leave us at the end of Year 6.

ROCKET GROUPS

From Reception to Year 6 the children are in one of five 'rocket groups'. These are family groups so that siblings are in the same one. Pupils can earn points for their rocket group for a whole range of positive behaviours in school. The rocket points for each class are totalled each week and collected by the Head Teacher. An ongoing competition takes place each half term to find the rocket group with the most points and prizes are awarded to the group with the highest total.

Other activity afternoons and competitions are arranged in rocket groups throughout the year, e.g. Sports Day, Easter craft afternoon and Rocket Group Rounders.

SCHOOL COUNCIL – THE BRAINWAVES

At the start of each school year the 5 rocket groups vote for two pupils from Year 5 and Year 6 who will represent them on our school council which we call the Brainwaves. This group meets each week and coordinates a range of fundraising ideas and projects, e.g. taking a lead on friendship week, designing the playground charter and organising 'walk to school week'.

We like children to be punctual, but for safety reasons, they should not be on the school premises more than 15 minutes before school starts. Late arrivals are recorded and punctuality and attendance are monitored regularly in school – see below.

Children should not leave school premises unless they go home for lunch or have written parental permission.

Children must remain at school until collected by an adult.

Pupils in Year 5 and Year 6 are allowed to go home unaccompanied at the end of the day. If your child is in Year 3 or Year 4 and you wish them to walk home unaccompanied, permission forms are available from the school office.

ATTENDANCE AND PUNCTUALITY

We have our own systems for rewarding good attendance and punctuality for both individuals and class groups:

- Class based incentives are there to reward individuals who manage to come to school on time every day and have 100% attendance
- Each week we have an attendance champions trophy for the class with the best attendance as well as a 'punctuality plaque' for the class with the fewest 'lates' recorded.
- After each half term we present certificates to the classes with the best average attendance and lowest number of 'lates'

- Individuals are rewarded with a certificate if they achieve 100% attendance for a term and we present special awards if any children manage a year of full attendance – something we recognise as a huge achievement!

There is a good level of friendly rivalry amongst classes to gain these awards and as a result of this healthy competition our attendance rates are now above the national average and we have very few pupils who are deemed to be persistent absentees.

Pupils enjoy coming to school at Eastlea and don't want to miss out on anything by being absent!

ABSENCE FROM SCHOOL

If your child is unable to attend school for any reason, please inform the school office by telephone on the first day of absence.

An absence is unauthorised if no reason is given or if it is not in accordance with DfE regulations. The rate of unauthorised absences in school is reported to the DfE.

If patterns of poor punctuality emerge or attendance falls below 90% (the national classification of persistent absence as from September 2015) then the Education Welfare Officer (EWO) will become involved. Parents will be contacted to alert them if patterns of attendance for individual pupils begin to cause concern.

In common with all other schools it is not possible to authorise any absences from school for family holidays – unless there are exceptional circumstances. As such any holidays taken in term time will be classed as unauthorised absence. A leave of absence form is required to outline the reasons for absence. Holidays should therefore be taken during designated school holidays wherever possible.

We have had very few instances of parents taking pupils out of school for holidays and as a school we have not been in the position of having to issue penalty notices thanks to the support of parents/carers and our common sense approach.

ARRANGEMENTS IN CASE OF ACCIDENT OR ILLNESS

In the event of a child becoming ill or having an accident in school, a member of staff will need to contact the parent/carer quickly. You are asked therefore to ensure that the contact details we have for you are up-to-date.

If your child has a minor accident, you will be informed by letter at the end of the day. If on the other hand, anything more serious occurs then you will be contacted immediately. **It is very important that you inform the school office of any changes to telephone numbers or addresses.**

In exceptional circumstances where your child requires a medicine, prescribed in their name, whilst at school [i.e. 4 doses a day] parents/carers are asked to leave this in the school office and to sign a parental request form.



EASTLEA SCHOOL UNIFORM



We have a school uniform at Eastlea which consists of the following:

- Grey/black or navy trousers, shorts, skirt or pinafore
- White shirt, blouse or polo shirt
- School sweatshirt or cardigan,
- School black shoes

In the summer months a summer dress (blue checks or stripes) can be worn as an alternative.

The school PE kit includes a plain white t-shirt, black shorts and either black sandshoes or trainers. A plain/dark tracksuit can also be worn in colder months.

SCHOOL MEALS – ‘HUNGRY HATCH’



Our ‘Hungry Hatch’ serves freshly cooked school lunches in the dining hall. A two course meal is provided daily, at a cost of £11.00 weekly [£2.20 per day]. Menus are designed to meet the nutritional requirements of young children and to introduce a wide variety of food. The menus follow a three week cycle and are changed a minimum of twice per year.

Our ‘Kitchen Committee’ of pupils from across the school meets with the cook to consider choices for the menus which are then displayed in the dining hall and sent home via newsletters for parents/carers. At certain times home grown food from our school garden is incorporated into the menu.

Children have lunch in one of 3 ‘sittings’ and collect their own meal at the serving hatch using “airline” style trays. Water is served with school dinners and this is supplemented on certain days by orange juice, milk or milkshake which forms part of the dessert options.

Each class is supervised by at least one lunchtime supervisor both in the hall and outside on the yard/field. These staff are vigilant in keeping an eye on the children and making sure that they enjoy a good meal at lunchtimes.

Social training is also an important aspect of the lunchtime and pupils are encouraged to talk quietly on their tables, show good table manners and help to clear their trays/cups/cutlery at the end of the meal. Provision is also made in the dining hall for those children who bring a packed lunch, but for safety sake we must insist that drinks are not brought into school in glass containers.

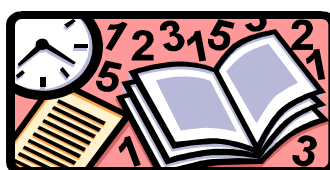
Dinner money is collected weekly in advance on a Monday morning for the current week, or paid on a daily basis, except for pupils in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 who are currently eligible for the government ‘Universal Free School Meals’ offer.

SCHOOL MILK

Nursery children are entitled to free milk, as are children in Reception until the beginning of the term in which their fifth birthday falls.

Children in Year 1, 2, 3 and 4 who receive free school meals will also receive free milk.

Other children may have milk at the cost of approximately £11.00 per term. The price varies depending on the length of the term and the administrative costs which are set by county. Orders are placed at the end of the preceding term.



THE CURRICULUM

The National Curriculum was introduced in 1989, revised in 2000 and then again in September 2014 (for Y1, Y3, Y4 and Y5) and September 2015 (for Y2 and Y6).

The 'new' National Curriculum has been adopted at Eastlea. More details about the areas covered in Literacy, Maths, Science, Computing and Context work (topics) are included in outline curriculum statements for different year groups on the school's website.

If you require any information or have any queries about the curriculum you should discuss these initially with the class teacher.

We have a very full programme of curriculum enrichment activities and first hand experiences in the form of visits out or visitors in school for children in all year groups.

ADDITIONAL CURRIULUM INFORMATION FOR OTHER SUBJECT AREAS

PHYSICAL EDUCATION (P.E.)



Physical Education develops pupils' physical competence and confidence, and their ability to use these to perform in a range of activities. It promotes physical skills, physical development and knowledge of the body in action. Physical education provides opportunities for pupils to be creative, competitive and to face up to different challenges. It promotes positive attitudes towards active and healthy lifestyles.

We provide all pupils in Key Stages 1 and 2 with the full entitlement of 2 hours of quality PE per week. We have a wide variety of sports clubs taking place before school, during lunchtime and after school.

LANGUAGES



French is introduced to the pupils in Key Stage 2. Learning another language fosters their curiosity and deepens their understanding of the world. Children are encouraged to express their ideas in another language, communicate for practical purposes and learn new ways of thinking. French lessons involve lots of role play scenarios in which the children are encouraged to try out their new language skills.

The curriculum is supported by a specialist language teacher who works with children in upper Key Stage 2.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION (R.E.)



We use the agreed syllabus for Religious Education in Northumberland to support the teaching of R.E. throughout our school. The children are encouraged to:-

- Develop an understanding of the traditions and beliefs of Christianity and how these affect our culture and moral values.
- Develop an understanding and knowledge of the other major faiths represented in Britain, including Buddhism, Hinduism, Islam, Judaism and Sikhism.
- Develop an understanding of the role religious beliefs play in the lives of individuals, families and communities.

In order to help the children achieve this understanding:

- R.E. Lessons are timetabled in both Key Stages 1 and 2.
- Special gatherings are held in school to celebrate occasions such as Harvest Festival, Christmas and various charity events.
- Representatives from various organisations and from the community are occasionally invited to share our assemblies.
- Assemblies are held during the week – including times for the whole school to meet together, key stage assemblies and class led assemblies.

Parents who wish to withdraw their children from Acts of Worship or Religious Education lessons are asked to inform the Head Teacher.



Our children experience a balanced programme of Music, comprising playing and performing, improvising and composing, listening and appreciating music from different traditions. Their skills are extended and developed using a variety of instruments including voice, tuned and untuned percussion and other instruments such as violins, recorders or ukuleles.

This helps the children express their ideas, feelings and moods through their own compositions and performances. It also enables personal reflection and emotional development.

Musical notation in different forms is used as a means of recording their music and playing the work of others. Music from different times and cultures is used to enhance the children's musical awareness.

The music curriculum is supported by specialist music teachers who work with children across Key Stage 2.

Health and Wellbeing/PSHE & Citizenship (Personal Social Health Education)



PSHE prepares our children for life in the 21st Century by teaching them to be good citizens, to look after themselves, each other and the world in which they live. We do this in direct teaching sessions, by examples we set as adults and by exploiting all other areas of the curriculum, whenever possible, to reinforce our teaching points.

An outline of the different elements covered in the PSHE Programme of Study (health and wellbeing, relationships and living in the wider world) can be accessed on the school website.

SEX & RELATIONSHIP EDUCATION



Sex Education in school is set within the planned personal, social and health education (PSHE) and Science framework.

The general approach ensures the emphasis is placed on family life, loving relationships and respect for others, all within a moral framework.

A partnership between home and school is vital to foster good relationships and keep parents informed and involved, so that they understand and support the purpose of our Sex Education Programme. The staff endeavour to answer children's questions honestly and sensitively as and when they arise. Anything requiring an answer in greater depth is referred to the parents. Our work in upper key stage 2 is supported by the school health team.

CLUBS AND ACTIVITIES

We are fortunate to have a good range of different clubs and activities available for our pupils. The list varies each year but as an example we have had the following opportunities in recent years:

SPORT AND MUSIC CLUBS

Sport has a high profile at Eastlea. We encourage pupils to develop the school games values of respect, self-belief, team work, honesty, passion and determination. We enter teams for as many school games competitions as possible and have a group of Year 6 Sports Leaders who work with younger pupils at lunchtimes to provide focused games and activities.

We make use of the opportunities offered by the Northumberland Music Hub to provide whole class instrumental tuition (currently violins) as well as curriculum support for all KS2 pupils on a rota basis.

CHILDREN WITH SPECIAL EDUCATIONAL NEEDS OR DISABILITIES (SEND)

The school operates its Special Educational Needs Policy in line with the DfE regulations – which have recently been updated – see our latest SEND Policy and SEND Information Report on the school website

When children are assessed and identified with SEND, we ensure that their needs are met and additional support is given where required, either within school or in collaboration with specialist external agencies. Children with SEND are taught and managed sensitively with a view to promoting their inclusion in all school activities as far as this can be reasonably arranged as well as promoting independence.

Children are taught within their class group and may receive additional support in small group situations. If the additional school intervention is not felt to be meeting a child's needs, then high needs funding may be required to provide additional support or an application for an Education Health and Care Plan can be made.

When additional specialist advice and support, beyond what is offered in school, is necessary, we contact the appropriate external agencies and work closely with them to promote the child's well-being and development. Our SEND Information Report provides further information about how this works and the agencies we work with.

For children who receive high needs funding or have an EHC plan, an Intervention and Support Plan is written. This is aimed at removing barriers to learning and putting effective special provision in place that is implemented and reviewed at least termly.

At all stages, parents and staff work together. Parents are fully informed and nothing happens without parental consent.

The Governing Body is committed to reviewing the arrangements and where necessary taking action to ensure that pupils with disabilities are not denied services specific to their needs. This is outlined in the school 'Accessibility Plan' which can be accessed via the school website.

GIFTED AND TALENTED PUPILS

For pupils who have a recognised 'talent', strength or ability in a certain curriculum area additional support is provided to ensure that work is appropriately challenging and allows for skills to be further extended and broadened.

EARLY YEARS

We have a vibrant Early Years learning environment with quality indoor and outdoor provision. The Nursery and Reception staff work closely together to ensure that the pupils are well supported throughout Early Years and they share the outdoor area and resources.

Over recent years we have extended our outdoor provision with the inclusion of a climbing frame, outdoor storage sheds, playground markings, wall mounted equipment, open 'role play' resources, a music wall, mud kitchen, water wall and easily accessible Literacy and Numeracy based learning resources.

The children learn through a carefully planned curriculum which incorporates play based creative learning opportunities as well as adult led learning tasks. This allows the children's own interests to be developed and also encourages the focused development of basic skills. Our aim is that by the end of Early Years our pupils are 'school ready' for the more formal KS1 curriculum.

EXTENDED SERVICES

Eastlea signposts parents/carers to local child care facilities or other parent support mechanisms, e.g. Kids Club on site, or the many Children's Centre opportunities in Cramlington. Strong links are established with healthcare and educational support services – all of which are outlined in our SEND Information Report (available on the school's website).

FRIENDS OF EASTLEA

This group was formed in 1999 and like a Parent Teacher Association, the group organises school events which raise money for use throughout the school, e.g. the annual Christmas and Summer Fairs which help to support school based projects and Golden Day activities. If anyone wishes to support this group and help out at school fundraising events then please contact Mrs Raimes via the school.

BEHAVIOUR POLICY

We have a simple, straightforward behaviour policy which everyone understands and adheres to. The policy is reviewed annually in consultation with staff and pupils via the 'Brainwaves'.

A summary of our latest behaviour policy is included at the back of this prospectus which outlines the rewards system and sanctions which are in place. The full policy is available from the school office on request.

Golden Days are a key part of our behaviour policy and these take place every half term as an incentive for pupils who follow our school rules. We promise an exciting 'end of term' event for everyone who earns the right to attend – either something in school, or a visit out somewhere. There are plenty of photos of recent Golden Days on our school website which will give you a flavour of what takes place and they often make the local press!

ANTI-BULLYING POLICY

Our anti-bullying policy is updated regularly. An application is currently being pursued for 'Anti-bullying accreditation'. Children are encouraged to talk to adults if anything is bothering them and where an incident of bullying behaviour has been identified, action is always taken as detailed in our policy.

SAFEGUARDING AND E-SAFETY

Our Safeguarding/child protection policy is update annually and is published on the school website.

To support our E-safety policy an ICT agreement is completed by each child and parent/carer. This aims to ensure safe access to the internet in school and reinforces the key messages of remaining safe when using computers generally. A separate 'School360' protocol is also in place to support pupils in using our secure learning platform.

VISITS OUT OF SCHOOL

All children will have various opportunities each year to make local visits or to take part in sporting competitions. Visits will be both educational and enjoyable and will be planned as part of curriculum delivery to enrich the learning through first hand experiences.

Permission is sought for all local visits at the start of each academic year. You will be notified in writing whenever your child is out of school and for some educational/residential visits we will require a voluntary contribution towards the cost.

If there are insufficient voluntary contributions, a visit may have to be cancelled. If this were the case, voluntary contributions would be returned.

Residential Visits are usually offered to upper Key Stage 2 pupils. These visits are two to three days long and will usually be at a field centre. Separate permission will be required for these visits.

Additional Activities include swimming for year 4 pupils, before school / lunchtime / after school clubs for all ages of pupil and social events for children/families organised during the year.
