


Dear Parents/Carers,



Today we started the countdown to our next 'Golden Day' which will take place on **Friday 25<sup>th</sup> May 2018**. We have decided to go for a 'different approach' this time and the teachers are going to plan an action-packed day with their own class completing a range of exciting topic themed activities.

There will be a whole host of varied things happening across the school – depending on what topic your child's class has been studying, including creative art and crafts, practical re-enactments, celebration events, some food tasting, costume design and making as well as individual and team challenges both indoors and out.

## As a guide, this is what your child's class will have as their focus:



- As there is so much planned it will be a **NON-UNIFORM DAY FOR EVERYONE!** If your child wants to come dressed in something fitting for the theme of <u>their</u> day they are welcome to, and I know that some costume items will be created during the day too! Or they can come casually dressed ready for a fun-filled day
- Usual arrangements for lunch please so your child will have their school lunch (£2.20 for those who pay) or a packed lunch as normal in the school hall perhaps with tricolour cakes for dessert!!
- 3.15pm usual arrangements for the end of the school day (or 11.50am for 15 hour Nursery pupils)

And the best news, as always, is that there will be no additional charge for this. The children do not have to bring in any money for coming in non-uniform, the practical activities, workshops or challenges. This is their treat for trying hard with their behaviour this half term. The only thing we ask is that a school lunch is funded as normal on the day or a packed lunch is provided.

As always attendance on our Golden Days is dependent on each child following the Eastlea rules in school and at lunchtimes. We are hoping to include all children; however, for those who are struggling to follow the rules, we have been or will be in contact with parents to discuss ways to support children to get them 'back on track' in terms of behaviour.
